

WEEK 1 | THE BEATITUDES | MATTHEW 5:1-12

Inspection - "What does it say?"

How many times are the words "will" or "will be" mentioned in the text? What does this mean?

What is it necessary to have in order to see God? (verse 8)

For what are the children of God known? (verse 9)

According to verses 11-12, what happened to those who served God as prophets?

Read Matthew 7:28-29. What was the reaction to Jesus' teachings on the mountainside?

Observation - "What does it mean?"

How many times does Jesus refer to the "kingdom of heaven" in the text? Why? What do the beatitudes teach us about the heart and character of God? How did Jesus demonstrate each of the beatitudes in His personal life? How do you define the word blessed compared to happy, fortunate, or lucky? What do each of the uses of the word "blessed" in the text seem to have in common?

Life Application - "What does it mean for me?"

Make a list of your spiritual blessings in Christ and review them daily this week.

Look this week for poor, brokenhearted, and suffering individuals in order to extend mercy to them.

Focus this week on being hungry and thirsty for righteousness.

Identify areas in your life where you need to grow in humility.
