Inspection – “What does it say?”

Why is patience vital in the Christian life?

What is the difference between faith and hope?

Is our hope in “what” or in “Whom,” and what is the difference?

What is the purpose of a forerunner? (some translations use this word in verse 20 in reference to Jesus)

What is the purpose of Jesus entering in verse 20?

Life Application – “What does it mean for me?”

Pray for strength daily to finish the Christian race faithfully.

Read chapters 12-25 of Genesis and reflect on God’s faithfulness to Abraham.

Make a list of God’s promises and reflect on verse 18.

Find Melchizedek in Genesis 14, Psalm 110, and Hebrews 7 and reflect on his importance.

What is necessary to become an “heir” of the promise available through Jesus?
